Tips for Improving Reading Level

- 1) Limit Graphic Novels/Comic Books while these books are great from time to time, the amount of pictures does not encourage students to **think** about what they're reading. This type of book should be an occasional treat, not a standard choice.
- 2) Practice Reading Aloud Since your child is assigned 30 minutes of reading per night, have him/her read aloud to you for 15 minutes. This encourages your child to practice reading fluently and accurately.
- 3) Push yourself to read a book that is **slightly** challenging reading a book that is too hard will be frustrating to your child and will not help him/her become a better reader. At the same time, reading books that are too easy will not help your child's reading skills. Aim to read books at the JUST RIGHT LEVEL or a little bit above. Your teacher can give you recommendations.
- 4) Read a book WITH your child Even as 5th graders, most students still enjoy being read to by an adult. Allowing children this opportunity lets them hear what a fluent reader sounds like. It can also lead to discussions and conversations, which can promote student's understanding.
